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## INTRODUCTION

Even allowing for the third Earl of Shaftesbury's comparatively early death on 4/15 February 1713, eleven days before his forty-second birthday, his extant, or rather his hitherto registered correspondence – at our last count 954 letters which span the final three decades of his life and of which just over half were penned by him – does not point to a strikingly prolific letter writer. A degree of shrinkage was to be expected, of course, and it is obvious from references throughout to specific letters sent or received that the collection now extant does not represent the original complete correspondence.<sup>1</sup> In one prominent case, the alleged loss of “letters in which Mr. Locke recommended Christianity to his Lordship”, albeit to “no avail”, was already “to be lamented” in the late eighteenth century,

though many years ha[d] not elapsed since they were read by two Gentlemen, who were so affected by the strong and pressing terms in which Mr. Locke expressed his sentiments, that they could not abstain from tears.<sup>2</sup>

While this anecdote may need to be treated with caution,<sup>3</sup> there are certainly grounds for the assumption that some of John Locke's letters to

the third Earl have indeed gone astray,<sup>4</sup> just as others, sent by the latter to Pierre Bayle or, for example, to Pierre Coste, by late 1711 his “only Book-Correspondant”,<sup>5</sup> remain untraceable. There is, however, no evidence to suggest that the third Earl’s letters suffered the same fate as those of Bayle, the original body of whose correspondence was deliberately and permanently stripped after his death in December 1706 of “des pans entiers”, in some instances perhaps because certain of his cautious correspondents “en position de pouvoir ont fait jouer leur influence pour faire soustraire des lettres qui risquaient de les compromettre comme les complices du «philosophe sceptique de Rotterdam»”, in others simply because money was to be made with them.<sup>6</sup> Although it is clear that a large number of letters addressed to Shaftesbury – their writers Bayle, Coste, Jean Le Clerc, and very probably John Locke – were separated from the bulk of his correspondence and passed on by the fourth Earl to an interested reader, his first cousin James Harris,<sup>7</sup> the only casualties of that extraction appear to have been the letters from Locke.<sup>8</sup>

If neither wholly intact, nor as vast as, say, Locke's correspondence,<sup>9</sup> the corpus of letters to and from Shaftesbury does offer a reasonably complete picture of his life, tracing for us not only his own particular understanding and attentive, even meticulous execution of his responsibilities first as son and heir, then paterfamilias, as owner of a large estate, and as active politician, but also of his profound interest in the philosophy and literature of the ancient and modern worlds, in the fine arts, in numismatics, in landscaping, gardening, and husbandry. The texts afford insights into the writing, publishing, and, in some cases, the translating of his published works from the late 1690s through to his elaborate preparations and instructions for the second, posthumously printed edition of *Characteristics*. They show us the strict health regimen and the constant, deliberate “*Presence of Mind*”<sup>10</sup> which made it physically and mentally possible for the Earl to remain active through years of deteriorating health and even during the weeks before his death. Finally, they allow us to observe his practical application, as a man of “good Temper, Honesty, Love of [his] Relations and Country, Sobriety, and Virtue”,<sup>11</sup> of that which he believed “teaches Happiness & gives the Rule of Life” – of philosophy.<sup>12</sup>

The life that can be reconstructed on the basis of the correspondence remains on occasion fragmentary, and particularly so for the early years covered in this volume. We have endeavoured to fill in the gaps caused either by the complete lack of letters or by the missing portions of exchanges (i. e. the initiation or the response), drawing to that end on various other documents preserved among Shaftesbury's papers and elsewhere. At various points, moreover, we include and number as correspondence texts which, while formally addressed in each case to a specific individual employed by the Earl, are more properly sets of instructions and orders,<sup>13</sup> our intention being thereby to illuminate aspects of his day-to-day occupations and, in addition, to demonstrate the rigour and thoroughness with which he attended to them.

Your kind expressions (my Dear L<sup>d</sup>) I received for y<sup>e</sup> which I give your Lordship many thanks. your Lordship must need think me to be very ill natured If I should think y<sup>t</sup> you should forget me, after y<sup>t</sup> you have 5 promised me so often y<sup>t</sup> you would never forget me; yet I must confess y<sup>t</sup> it is your kindness towards me to reassure me of your Lordships new favours. I was very glad to hear in my Bro: Smiths<sup>2</sup> letter y<sup>t</sup> you was to keep your Chrstmas at Winton, not doubting but y<sup>t</sup> y<sup>r</sup> Lordship will be as merry there as you would a been at S<sup>t</sup> Giles.<sup>3</sup> My Lady gives her blessing 10 to you, and I told her y<sup>t</sup> you had write a letter to her Ladysp: on sunday: y<sup>e</sup> which her Ladyship never received, she would have write to you ere now but y<sup>t</sup> she did not know whether you did doe to S<sup>t</sup> Giles or stay at Winton, I suppose y<sup>t</sup> it will not be Long before y<sup>t</sup> you will hear from her, pray my dear Lord: doe not forget her for I doe assure you y<sup>t</sup> your 15 letters has been y<sup>e</sup> greatest comfort to her imaginable, and will be, for she is always a talking of you with y<sup>e</sup> kindest expressions y<sup>t</sup> can be thought of. ## 1684

Apart from one entry made by the second Earl in the *Day Book* – 13 June, “Gave my Son Ashley 001-00-00” – we have found no record of the boy’s movements during this year, most of which he appears to have spent at Winchester College; the “Children” with whom the Earl went to Salisbury in December of this year were most likely his daughters.<sup>1</sup>

## 1685

The second Earl spent £1 5s. on “New Years Gifts” for “y<sup>e</sup> Children”,<sup>2</sup> those again most likely his three daughters. A fourth – Gertrude – would be born at Kensington seven months later on 30 July. As far as we can
